IBERIAN TILE TABLE RUNNER

This intriguing woven chain effect is the result of basic squares and rectangles assembled with particular attention to color arrangement. Inspired by a tiled floor in a Spanish church, the colors of this eye-catching table runner can be easily adapted to match your décor.

CUTTING

Measurements include $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowances.

From white, cut:

- 10 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ") A rectangles
- 8 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ ") B squares
- 6 ($3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $12\frac{1}{2}$ ") C rectangles

From navy, cut:

- 10 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ") A rectangles
- 10 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ ") D rectangles

From each of dark pink and orange, cut:

- 1 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$) A rectangle
- 2 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$) B squares
- 1 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$) D rectangle

From each of red, olive, and bright blue, cut:

- 2 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$) A rectangles
- 2 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$) B squares

From each of green, light blue, pink, yellow, and turquoise, cut:

- 2 ($2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$) B squares

From backing, cut:

- 1 (16" x 68") rectangle

From binding, cut:

- 4 ($2\frac{1}{4}$ " x 40") strips

ASSEMBLY

1. Using a design wall, arrange the 5 blocks separately—Block 1, Block 2, Block 3, Block 4, and Block 5—following the **Five Blocks Assembly Diagram** for color placement.

2. Each block consists of 2 sub-units. Block 1, Block 3, and Block 5 follow the same assembly process. Sew pieces together using the **Block 1 Top Unit Assembly Diagram** and **Block 1 Bottom Unit Assembly Diagram**. Sew the units to create the block. Make blocks 1, 3, and 5.

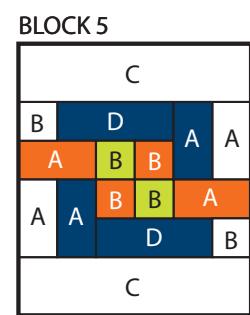
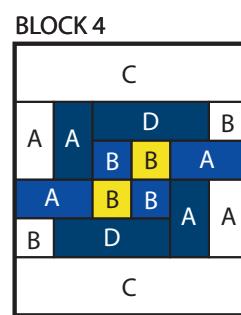
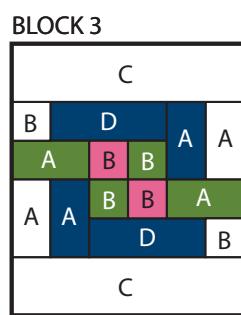
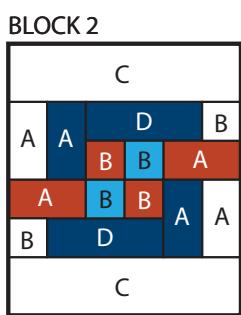
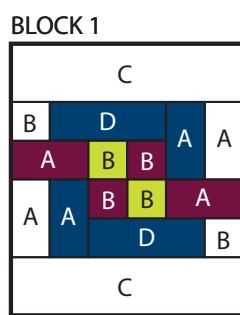
MATERIALS

Finished Size: 12" x 64"

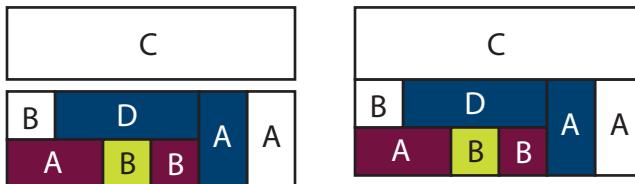
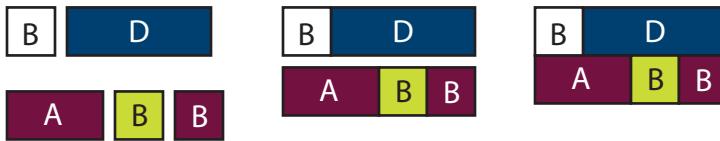
- $\frac{5}{8}$ yard white (Soft White)
- $\frac{3}{8}$ yard navy (Midnight)
- $\frac{1}{8}$ yard each of dark pink (Jewel), orange (Tangerine), bright blue (Cobalt), yellow (Star Fruit), pink (Raspberry), olive (Asparagus), turquoise (Azure), green (Lime), light blue (Mist), and red (Lipstick)
- $\frac{1}{3}$ yard binding (Table runner shown used a stripe printed on the bias.)
- 2 yards backing
- 16" x 68" low loft cotton batting

Fabric requirements assume 40" usable width of fabric.

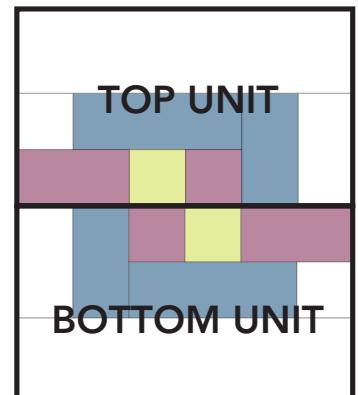
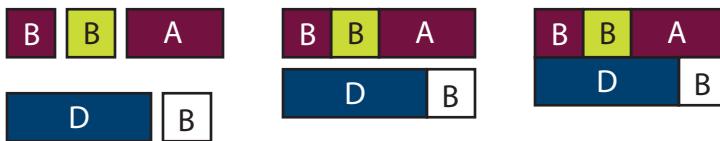
NOTE: Fabrics used in the quilt shown are from the Cotton Couture collection by Michael Miller Fabrics. Color names are in parentheses.



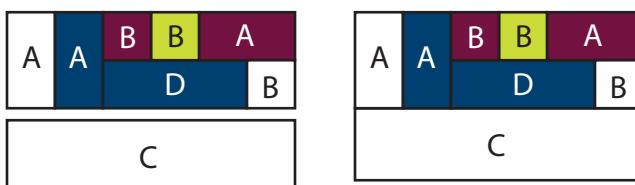
Five Blocks Assembly Diagram

3. Block 2 and Block 4 follow the same assembly process. Sew pieces together using the **Block 2 Top Unit Assembly Diagram** and **Block 2 Bottom Unit Assembly Diagram**. Sew the units to create the block. Make blocks 2 and 4.

Block 2 Bottom Unit Assembly Diagram. Sew the units to create the block. Make blocks 2 and 4.

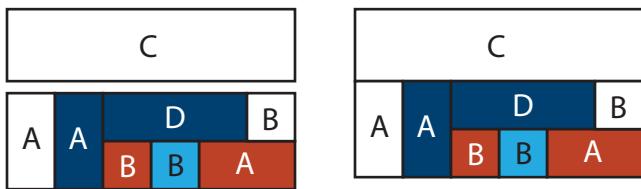
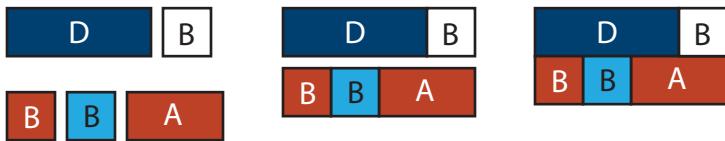
4. Following the **Table Runner Top Assembly Diagram**, arrange all five blocks; sew them together paying careful attention to the diagram to orient them properly.

TIP: The non-white strips on each block should match up along the joining seams, as should the white rectangles.

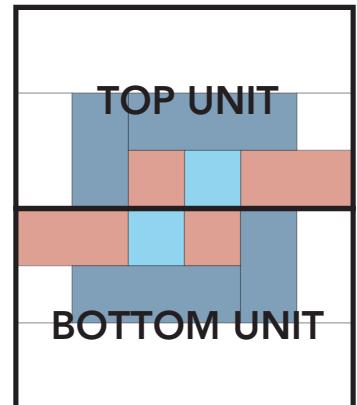
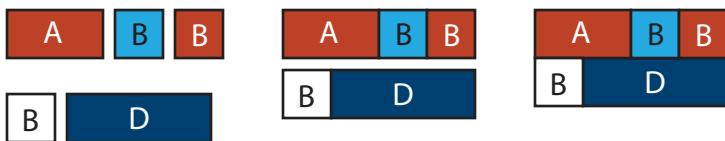
FINISHING

1. Layer backing, batting, and quilt top; baste. Quilt as desired. Quilt shown was quilted in a combination of straight lines, organic curves, and elongated zig-zag running stitch.

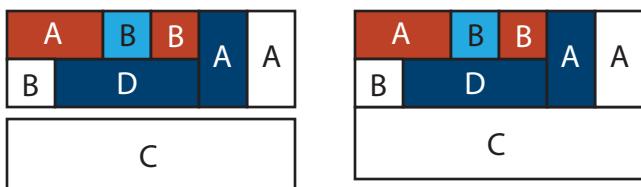
2. Sew 2 1/4 "-wide binding strips into 1 continuous piece for straight-grain French-fold binding. Bind the quilt.

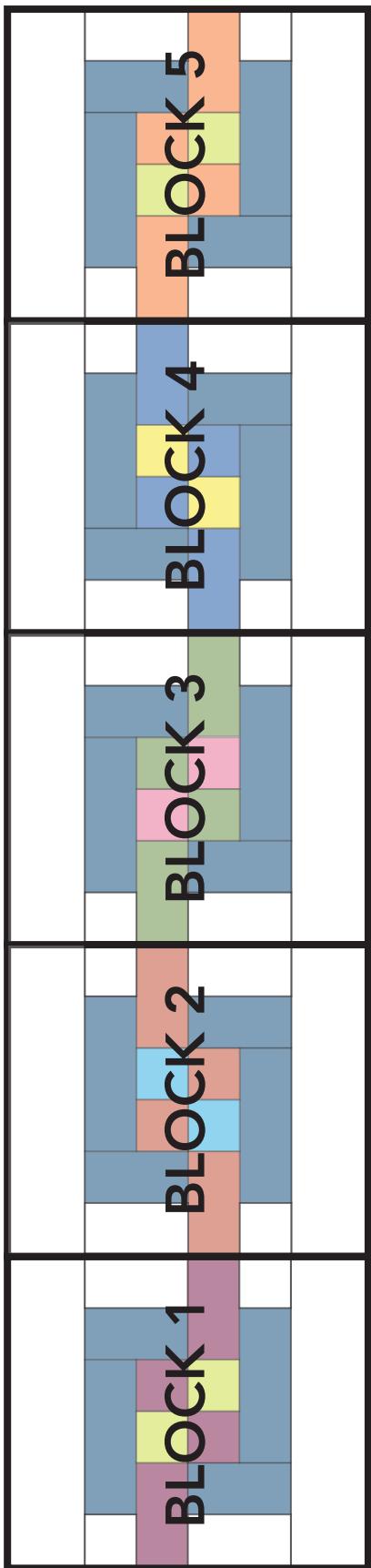


Table Runner Top Assembly Diagram
